ALLERTON THE TROTTER

Allerton, the famous trotter died July 5, 1910 at the Warren County Fairgrounds. Allerton was an Iowa horse and was owned by C.W. Williams of Independence, Iowa, until 1907 when he was purchased by Harry E. Hopper of Indianola. Allerton was almost 25 years old and had a record of 2.09 $\frac{1}{4}$. Yet today in 1980, a plaque and stone for Allerton can be seen west of the main entrance gate to the Warren County Fairgrounds. Have you seen it?

BITS FROM STATE CONFERENCE

From Ben Bloxham - Lecturer on England and Wales

1. Genealogy places emphasis on surnames and charting them down through the years. Heraldry is interested in descent, especially of nobility. We in the United States are more interested in ascent and not so interested in royalty. We want to find out the total life of those people. So - our work is a combination of information on places, occupations, political, religious and societal veins of the lives of our ancestors.
2. In England, every county has a trained archivist. This is great! We may write ahead to that County (or shire), state the date you will arrive there. The archivist will have collected all your materials available on a table and have a reserved chair awaiting you.

1. Germanic Research really includes Austria, Switzerland, Holland, etc.
2. Do your homework in America before attempting Germanic Research.
 - (a) Look at family bibles, old letters and diaries
 - (b) Look at published biographies of important people
 - (c) Check naturalization papers or place where naturalization took place.
 - (d) Check Church Records and Cemeteries
 - (e) Check Wills
 - (f) Read about the part of the country where your people came from
 - (g) Study the history of that area
 - (h) Try passenger lists
