Lay Researcher Problems

Beginning researchers are confronted with many interesting and sometimes confusing factors. Handwriting old and new, can be a

problem. Dates, old and new, can be another problem.

In handwriting the most common peculiarity is the use of the long s" commonly misinterpreted as an "f" or "p" (example = "mif Smith" for Miss Smith).

The civil year dates prior to 1752 began in March and March was colled the "fingt month".

called the "first month". Thus April was the second month and can be found expressed 25 (2) meaning 25th day of April.

To correct old style to new style, March must be recknned as the third month. Then add ten days to all dates 1582-1700 and 11 days to dates between 1700 and 1752. For the single year 1600, 11 days must be added. GOOD LUCK!

If reckoning birth dates in Europe, British Isles, etc., don't forget time zones. Your ancestor may have a recorded birth dates as June 12 in Scotland but June 11 in Iowa. Time zones make the difference!
