One night about the first of March there was discovered several cracks in the corner of the sleeping rooms it created quite a penic all the companies except Co. B gathered their duds & spent the bal of the night on the payment most of Co. B stuck to their nest them that did not stag dance. Next day all the other Co's. came back and staid till 19th of March when we left for St. Louis. We heard afterward the hardling collapsed about a month after we left. It was not occupied at the time and no one was hurt. If it had fell with half of us would have been killed.

On the 19th of March 1862 we boarded the steamer Minnehaha for St. Louis where we arrived the next day and went into Benton Barracks. Have we got our guns the Springfield rifles Musket new & nice also mules & Wagons & practiced Bat drill. On the first of April we boarded the same old steamer and steamed away for Pittsburg Landing where we sended Sunday morning April 6th to take part in one of the greatest battles of history. I forgot to mention that while at St. Louis our second Sargent N. B. Wigins went to Cap Smith and wanted to give up his place as Sargent to take charge of an ambulance. came to me and asked me if I would take Wiggins place. I told him I certainly would and glad to do so and I was promoted. We were landed at the landing and drew up in line piled our knapsacks in a row and marched to the top of the hill drew up in line and got 40 rounds of ammunition. Soon after started for the line of battle which we had no trouble in finding. We met soldiers coming back wounded in every shape and a good many without a scratch. Someone started Old John Brown which helped the courage some. When we got where the Rebels could see us they sent a shell just clearing Co. B where it exploded. Comrad Conrad Wengel of my company say good morning Sor in his Welch brogue but a minute after he was killed being the first man killed in our Co. if not in the Reg. About this time an officer rode up to the Golonel H. T. Reed tld him to left oblique and form a line of battle. I being 2nd Sargent of the rear Co. I had to take a small field flag and place myself to designate the line. 2nd Sargent Co. A had to do the same for the other end of the Regiment. When we got to position we went to loading and shooting and it soon got so smoky we had to fire by guess but we done good execution.

I was over the same ground the next Tuesday. I was out with the Burial party. The ground in places was covered with dead of both sides. I received a shot through my haversack which grazed my hide and burnt for a bit like fun. Orderly Sargent Henry Morland was struck on top of head knocking out a piece of skull the size of a silver dollar it crazed him for a bit he slamed his gun down & swore he could lick the son of a B that done it. Our Col. got a ball across the back of the neck which tumbled him off of his horse. The agutent went to him he told the Agt to tell his wife he died fighting for his Country but the best joke he was on his horse in less than a week and lived quite a while after the war was over.

The Siege of Corinth commenced right away after Shiloh Battle during the siege there was considerable change in Co. officers. Capt. Smith resigned, A. G. Studer was promoted, Capt., Lanstrum promoted to 1st Lieut., that left a vacancy in commissioned officers. Our orderly, Sargent Morlan was discharged so I got commissioned 2nd Lieutenant dating from 24th of May 1862 this I thought was pretty good change still it had a good deal of work for me for Studer was away on sick leave and Lanstrum was on Crocker's Staff. My Orderly and I John S. Greene had our hands full but I had the good will of all the boys and had no trouble with them.

Barb halped with the middle school T.A.G. class in genealogy taught by Anita Allen. Louise was a guest speaker for one of the classes. The 1872 atlas is being indexed by Molly and Maude. Bertine is indexing the Lacona histories. Purchased the 1850 thru 1880 federal census film for Warren county. Thelma and Marieta attended the last IGS quarterly meeting on Irish research. Members have worked at the IGS library on a regular basis. Barb, Louise, Twilla, Peg and Charlotte Hardin spent two days at the historical library in Iowa City for research. The birth record project is well under way again and making terrific progress. We initiated a "get acquainted" roll call at our regular meetings. Members charts are being published in our newsletter. Started a "help for problems" time at our meetings. A number of 1872 atlases have been sold with the profit going to the historical soc. 22 cemetery books have been sold. A limited number remain. Queries from members and non-members have been published in our newsletter. Ten newsletters have been published this year. Our newsletter exchange with other clubs continues and is expanding. Barb, Marieta and Louise have enrolled as IGS speakers on genealogy and related topics. Public has been invited to our meetings via the county newspaper. A new genealogy division has been arranged with the fair board to begin at this years county fair. This includes a junior division for those 16 and under. An update on the vital statistics rule was presented by Ed McConnell, head archivist for the state of Iowa at our September meeting. Copies of the original 1847 plat maps of Warren county were purchased for our library. The Marion county atlas was purchased. Twilla and Peg attended the Everton workshop at Newton In June. Louise, Pauline and others attended the tour to Washington D.C. in June. We hosted visitors from Marion, Madison, Lucas, Polk and Des Moines counties this year.
