WRITING YOUR HISTORY

- 1. Giv a physical description photos
- 2. Describe the inner qualities of the person
 - a. put emphasis on the human qualities of the person and the accomplishments will speak for themselves
 - b. list accomplishments of individual in chronological order
 - c. find contrasting stories for accomplishments
 - d. remember that the person is or was very human
- 3. Relationship with others very seldom is a person seen alone
- 4. Death information a biography is dis appointing if it does not include the death scene
- 5. Family history must be accurate complete, unbiased and objective
 - a. The material omitted is the subtle test of accuracy
 - b. Is it truth or hearsay?
- 6. Quoting
 - a. Summarize most of the material building so that the quote becomes the most significant part of the section
 - b. most novices quote too often and at too great a length
 - c. Type the quote on a separate sheet of paper. Cross out anything that can just as easily be summarized Keep cutting. Summarize.
 - d. give credit to the source of quotes
- 7. Dialogue
 - a. It better reveals the personality of the person.
 - b. It makes you feel you are there listening to events as they occur.
 - c. It takes the past and brings it to the present by making scenes vivid and direct.
 - d. Adds variety to a page.
 - e. Often a sentence or phrase is sufficient.
- 8. Avoid a superview give the feeling of suspense.
 - a. Try to pretend you are a reporter on the scene trying to record an event.
- 9. How you say it
 - a. Am I trying to say too much?
 - b. Is this section necessary?
 - c. Is this material in the wrong place in the book?
 - d. Do I have enough material?
 - e. Have I approached the material with the right attitude?
- 10. Clarity through continuity
 - a. Devote a chapter or section to each generation Suggest: Section One - Great, Great-Grandparents

The following is a list of questions given by our WCGS member Marieta Crissom. It is a series of questions you might like to follow while interviewing a person you want to add to your family history.

CHILDHOOD AND YOUTH

- 1. When and where were you born? Did you ever move? What do you remember about the house/houses you grew up in? the other buildings? types? garden? shrubs?
- 2. Describe parents: physical traits or characteristics, personality occupation. What did they consider important in life? What do you know about their past?
- 3. Brothers and sisters: names and birthdates in relation to your own? Dk you remember anything in particular about the arrival of a new brother/sister? How was the event treated?
- 4. What were your responsibilities at home? Before and after school, summer, etc?
- 5. School days: how long were you able to attend? Special events at school? Special accomplishments? What did you take for lunch? Behavior of other students? etc...
- 6. Religion in your home? Church, where was it? Activities?
- 7. Playmates -- childhood friends -- what did you do? Where did you play? Did you have a favorite toy or place to play?
- 8. Childhood diseases and other sickness in your home--you or your brothers/sisters--parents?
- 9. Any serious accidents or narrow excapes?
- 10. Favorite foods?
- 11. Clothing--styles, who made them? When did you get new clothes?
- 12. Visitors in your home: relatives and/or friends?
- 13. Did you ever take any trips? Where? When? Who with?
- 14. How did you celebrate Christmas? Tree, other decorations? Any that you particularily remember? Gifts--that you gave or received? Special baking?
- 15. Other holidays -- how did you celebrate them? Easter, 4th of July, Thanksgiving?
- 16. Storms and disasters -- wind, hail, snow -- any that you specifically remember?
- 17. Neighborhood gatherings: clubs, threshing, socials, etc.
- 13. Fairs or other special events--Indianola, Des Moines? What preparations were necessary?
- 19. What do you remember of your grandparents, aunts, uncles? What were your impressions of them? Any specific events that you remember with any of them?

ADULTHOOD

- 1. How did you and your spouse meet?
- 2. Had you dated others? Describe.
- 3. Describe your courtship--length, activities, where did you go? What did you do? Any special events? Any especially fun or embarrassing moments?
- 4. What were your impressions of your future in-laws? How did your parents feel?
- 5. What kind of preparations did you and your family make for your wedding? Future spouse and his/her family's preparations?
- 6. Describe your wedding: clothing, people involved, location, decorations, weather, gifts?
- 7. Describe your first home: number of rooms, size, furnishings, wallcoverings, floor coverings, whatever you can remember.
- 8. How did you feel as a new bride/groom? Any burnt biscuits, etc?
- 9. The first year: occupation, building up a new home, garden, canning, washing clothes, cooking, etc.
- 10. Childbirth: how did you prepare for it? Your feelings afterwards? Help in the home?
- 11. Child care? Foods, bathing, etc. Toys?
- 12. Moving? When? Where? How often? Preparations? Moving day? Settling in? Feelings about moving?
- 13, Visitors in your home?
- 14. Trips? Where? When?
- 15. Holiday celebrations?
- 16. Accidents or narrow escapes? Illnesses?
- 17. Storms and disasters?
- 18. Role of church?
- 19. Children in school?
- 20. Neighborhood gatherings?
- 21. Fairs and other special events?
- 22. Describe how you feel about the life you have lead. What message or thoughts would you like to leave for others to follow?
