D. A. R. - Daughters of American Revolution
Some Interesting Facts

There are about 209,000 active members, making up the largest women's organization whose membership is based on lineal descent.

The D.A.R. is a national society founded by women for historical, educational, and patriotic purposes.

First organized in October 1890 as a patriotic desire to honor the men and women whose sacrifices made our country free and independent and to perpetuate the freedoms for which our ancestors fought.

Why do we join the D.A.R.?

- 1) It provides the means for active personal participation in preserving the American heritage of personal, economic, political and religious freedom.
- 2) To preserve the memory and traditions of your own Revolutionary Ancestors in a permanent genealogical record for the sake of your family.
- 3) To promote and assist in the proper celebration of our historic anniversaries
- 4) To find in the society the inspiration to live patriotically in our generation as our forebears did in theirs.
- 5) To join hands with others who cherish our priceless heritage, so that we can more efficiently promote the ideals of patriotism and love of country.

Who is eligible to join D.A.R.?

- 1) Any woman not less than a) eighteen years of age and who is b) descended from a man or woman, who with unfailing loyalty to the cause of the American Independence served as c) a sailor, soldier, or civil officer in one of the several colonies or states d) or as a recognized patriot rendered material aid.
- 2) You must be able to prove your own blood line back to an ancestor who gave military service or helped the American cause in the Revolutionary War.

A card file of all proven Revolutionary ancestors is maintained by the Registrar General's office in National Headquarters, Washington, D.C.

Your ancestral application must contain:

- 1) name of ancestor
- 2) service rendered
- 3) names of officers under which he served if military
- 4) state in which he lived
- 5) dates and places of birth and death (these are important)
- 6) place of residence during Revolution, if proven
- 7) name of wife or wives, if known
- 8) national number of members descended from ancestor
- 9) name of child and spouse through whom each member descends.

All application papers are checked against this file for a previously established ancestor. The following information from the file is noted on a separate card and attached to your application:

- a) national numbers credited with the particular patriot you claim
- b) child through whom the line is traced. (any difference in information appearing on the card and application is then examined by the N.S.D.A.R. highly skilled professionally trained genealogical staff.
- c) an applicant's paper is verified after the genealogist determines there is proof of lineage and all is in proper order with necessary documentation and references.
- d) if mistakes occur or evidence is inconclusive with resources available at National Headquarters, applicant is notified. This is not a rejection to membership, only a request for further information so application can be verified.
- e) applications based on previously accepted members go through the same process and are not automatically accepted.

Upon receipt of additional data your application can be reexamined and submitted. When this has been verified by a genealogist the paper is filed by the clerical division, in the state and chapter order. If a new ancestor or patriot is established, the record is added to the national file of ancestors of the Revolution.

When application is approved, it receives a national number which is your number forever. This number is entered in the master membership file.

Duplicate index cards are sent to the Recording Secretary General for preparation of your Certificate of Membership.

It may take possibly a year before your application is approved. Over 665,000 applications and 116,000 supplemental records are in the process of being microfilmed. Every effort is being made to process requests promptly and carefully.

Your ancestors records will be permanently preserved for the future generations of your family.

MASSACHUSETTS: Vital records, 1841 to 1890, have been transferred from the Registry of Vital Records to the State Archives in the State House, Boston, MA 02133, as a result of a new law passed by the State of Massachusetts. The same bill has provided for restrictions to be lifted on vital records held in local cities including adoptions and out-of-wedlock births. (Clarke Co. Gen. Soc. Newsletter, Mar 1984 via Eastern Neb. Gen. Soc. Newsletter)

The first book is of the four cemeteries in Independence Township: Brushy, Middedgeville, Cozad, and Johnson. HOME STUDY PROGRAM: The National Genealogical Society offers a comprehensive 16-lesson home study course prepared for amateurs and experience researchers who want to upgrade their knowledge and skills. American Genealogy: A Basic Course will help on to find genealogical information, how to evaluate who you find, and how to organize your records.

KANSAS DESCENDANTS: The Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies will issue a Pioneer or Territorial Certificate to Kansas descendants within certain time periods. A territorial certificate to a descendant of a person who was living in Kansas prior to 29 January 1861. A pioneer certificate to a descendant of a person living in Kansas between 29 January 1861 and 30 December 1880. OHIO RESEARCH: The Ohio Gene. Soc., P. O. Box 2625 Mansfield, OH. 44906, has a copy of index page for the surname you are researching. With this copy you will be sent a map of Ohio showing the township and codes used in the 1850 and 1860 census indexes. The researcher may then select the names he wants copies, giving name, code, page number, and roll number (if needed). Information on up to 5 families on the same roll for \$2.00, plus 25¢ for each additional name on the same roll. Family on another or second roll \$1.00 plus 25¢ for each additional family on that roll. (Clarke Co. WA, Newsletter, Apr 84)
