HISTORY BOOK REPORT: Work is progressing well on the history project. Close to 300 stories have been received and are now being processed. The first batches of stories sent to Dallas for keyboarding are back and are ready to proof. The rest are in various stages of being prepared for Dallas. This consists of recording the material when it is received, billing for extra lines and photos, typing the handwritten stories, numbering the pictures and stories for identification, then proofing the material, indexing and proofing the index. The pages are then xeroxed, recorded on another form and shipped to Dallas for keyboarding.

About 200 books have now been sold or reserved and around 500 story spaces have been reserved. There are quite a number of reserved stories that have not been turned in at this time. It your stories are among these, now is the time to get them turned in. Don't be left out!!

This year we have filled out a lot of forms, dealt with two publishers and spent a lot of money. We've changed our meeting location and moved our library. We've also tried to conduct regular business. I want to briefly review the year so we can appreciate our accomplishments.

Our by-laws were changed to allow the year to run from January to January. The new officers took over in January. The process was started to Incorporate WCGS and to qualify for tax-exempt status from IRS.

Molly finished typing our book Birth Records of Warren County, Iowa through 1920.

and Twilla prepared a nice brochure to advertise the book.

In April we took the book to Anundson's in Decorah to have it printed. We had the money to prepay the bill! We got them back in July and have sold about half of them.

In June we received our Incorporation Papers and in October we got our sales tax permit. On June 17th we signed a contract with Curtis Media to print the <u>History of Warren County</u>, Iowa.

During the summer we started binding books and pamphlets and preparing our library to be moved. In November most of our holdings were placed in the new Genealogy Section of the new Indianola Public Library. We now hold our meetings at the library.

This year we acquired two free microfilm readers, purchased a microfiche reader, a heavy duty stapler and a Royal Copier. We also applied for a postal permit and mailed the advertising brochures for the history project.

It has been a busy year, but this next one will be busier. During the next four months we willhave to push very hard to complete our History Book. Your help will be needed to index, make phone calls, proofread and work to advertise and promote the stories and the book. The project can not be completed on schedule if we don't encourage and push our friends and neighbors to write stories for the book. Keep this in mind and tell someone about the book everyday.

We also need to promote the birth book. We have about 250 of them left. It's a very nice book that is valuable to a lot of genealogists and local residents. We just need to remind them that books are still available.

Molly and Sheryl did a fine job of orchestrating our division at the County Fair. All of our showcases got a new paint job thanks to Molly. They also lined up booths at Log Cabin Days and at the IGS Convention in Des Moines.

As our membership grows. I want each of you to meet and know the members of WCGS. Our common interest in genealogy has brought us together and we want to nuture the friendships we have found in our organization.

As I look over the last year, it seems we have taken many "business" like steps. Yet we are not business or professional people, we are volunteers who often neglect our own genealogical research to preserve and gather county data. People who have benefited from our efforts often express their thanks and I want to emphasize that by saying I also appreciate your efforts. This year will be a tough one - compiling and printing a 1.000 page book while conducting our usual business, providing good programs and maybe doing a little personal research on the side. Let's work together - and it will happen! God Bless You. Barb.

### PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT:

The publication committee is responsible for publishing the program book, preparing packets of genealogical material for the fall workshop and organizing material for publication in the IGS Hawkeye Heritage.

1985 was a transition year for the program book. Material for the 1985 year was included in the 1984-85 book. An update sheet was included in the January 1985 newsletter containing new officers and committees with the old books being used through the full year. Work on the 1986 program book is now in progress.

The fall workshop was postponed until spring due to the heavy work load on the History project, with no packets needed.

The 1872 Warren County Atlas has been indexed and is ready to be typed for use in the IGS Hawkeye Heritage when time allows. Molly Bowlin, chairman.

## EDITOR'S REPORT:

Ten issues of the WCGS newsletter were prepared, printed and distributed to members and exchange groups in 1985, each containing approximately six pages.

At the start of the year approximately 85-90 were prepared each month, 61 to member and 18 to exchange clubs with the remainder going to our file.

During 1985 the following groups were added to our exchange list: Old Fort Genealogical Society, Fort Madison, IA; Keo-Mah Tracers, Oskaloosa, IA; Poweshiek County Searchers, Montezuma, IA; Union County Genealogical Society, Creston, IA; Des Moines County Genealogical Society, Burlington, IA; Hardin County Genealogical Society, Eldora, IA; LDS Library, Salt Lake City, UT; Iowa Historical Library, Iowa City, IA; Library of Congress and the National Archives in Washington, DC.

At the close of the year, approximately 110 newsletters were being prepared each month, 65 to members and 31 to exchanges with the remainder to our file. Additional newsletters were printed when guests were expected at the monthly meeting.

The purchase of a xerox copier has greatly improved the legibility of the newsletter as well allowing a wider variety of material to be used. A black and white photo was published in the November issue with success.

The addressing system was simplified and speeded with the purchase of xerox address labels.

#### COUNTY FAIR REPORT:

Superintendents for the 1985 year were Molly Bowlin and Sheryl Ledlie. Howard Snedden of Des Moines served as judge.

Nineteen people registered their material in the senior division with seventeen actually exhibiting. Seven juniors registered with three actually showing.


DID YOU KNOW ??

A SUGGESTION FOR A NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION: A good New Year's Resolution is to promise to DOCUMENT YOUR SOURCES from this day forth! This means to write down the source of your information in such a way that you can go back and find the information again if necessary. Documenting material that you copied from a book means copying the author, title of book, publisher, date of publication, and page number. Documenting a conversation or letter means writing the full name of the person, their address, the date and adding a note about your opinion of the reliability of their information. Material copied from a Bible should include the same information as for books listed above, plus your comments on the handwriting-by one person or several-and the location of the Bible. Cemetery records copied from tombstones should include the location of the cemetery, the date you visited, location of the tombstones and pictures of the tombstones would be a good addition to your records. In years to come, some of these tombstones will be lost; if the record is important in your research, you may want to have the tombstone and its location notarized. There's always a few ornery relatives in everyone's family who will say, "How do you know that?" It's nice to be able to show them how you know your records are correct!! (San Angelo Gen. & Hist. The Project borrows newspapers in order to catalog and microfilm them, then returns them to the lender.
