TRIFLES THAT CAN LEAD TO BOOK DAMAGE by Dorothy Lower.

The problem which is common to all libraries is the wear and tear inflicted on the collection by constant usage. This can be particularly disastrous in the case of a genealogy collection.

Much of the damage is done unintentionally by unthinking researchers. One of the most common offenders is the person who researches with a pen in his hand. He may unconsciously mark a name or paragraph which is pertinent to his research and it is impossible to erase such a mark. For this reason most libraries insist (or try to) that the patron use pencil only when working with the genealogy collection.

Some readers seem to be ignorant of the fact that turning down the corner of a page to mark the place causes irreparable damage. It doesn't require too much effort to place a piece of paper between the pages.

Licking the fingers to turn pages is unthinkable since it not only damages the paper, but is most unsanitary.

The spine of the book is the most important component in its construction and anything which damages it can ruin the book. Pressing down on the opened book when photocopying a page can crack the spine. This is one reason that many large libraries do not allow the patron to do his own copying, but will do it for him. Piling several open books on top of each other weakens the spine, which eventually give way.

Some damage done to books is intentional and should be specifically guarded against. The patron who is too lazy to copy material by hand or too cheap to photocopy it will resort to tearing out the page or pages in which he is interested. This not only ruins a good book, but is against the law in most states. While these things may seem trifling, the genealogy collection is made up of unusual and often valuable books which are difficult, it not impossible to replace.

POSTAL SERVICE VS. BEATRICE BAYLEY

Currently, Beatrice Bayley is the subject of two administrative proceedings within the U.S. Postal Service. Both were brought under 39 U.S.C. \$3005 which prohibits conducting a scheme or device for obtaining money or property through the mails by means of false representation. In one proceeding, the Postal Service alleges that Beatrice Bayley, Inc., is in violation of a consent agreement entered into with them in 1980 in that it "continues to represent that persons remitting money in response to Beatrice Bayley's direct mail advertising materials will receive a Family Heritage Book specifically about the ancestry and family name of the addressee." As a result, mail addressed to Beatrice Bayley, Inc. is now being held by the Postal Service, and such mail will continue to be held until the Judicial Officer reaches a decision in this matter. SURNAME INDEX - VOLUME V

by the lowa Genealogical Society

The objectives of the lowa Genealogical Society's SURNAME INDEX project are:

- 1. To help individuals locate other genealogists working on the same family lines.
- 2. To provide reference sources not easily found.
- 3. To publish a SURNAME INDEX from the names submitted.

Volume I was published in 1972, Volume II in 1975, Volume III in 1977, and Volume IV in 1983. Together, these contain almost 130,000 names.

These indexes are like a huge query index, giving pertinent information concerning one's ancestor, and are cross-indexed to facilitate finding either the male or female lines. These volumes are in homes and libraries across the United States. Their value will only increase with the years as more and more records are destroyed.

We are now accepting your names for Volume V to be published in the mid 1980's. Your ancestor need not have an Iowa connection to be included in this book. PLEASE FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY and re-check for accuracy as the committee cannot do research to prove a suspected incorrect date or spelling.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR VOLUME V

- 1. Use only 3"x 5" white index cards. Pre-printed surname index cards are available from IGS at a cost of \$.01 each. The format on these cards MUST be followed. DO NOT use colored cards.
- 2. Type or print legibly. Use only blue or black ball point pen. DO NOT use red ink or felt tip pens, these tend to smear and do not reproduce on microfilm. Use only liquid white out for corrections.
- 3. ALL cards must have the submitters name and address on the back.
- 4. Capitalize ALL SURNAMES; given names in small type.
- 5. Write dates beginning with day, then month (abbbreviated), then the year.
- 6. Abbreviate using only standard abbreviations as found in the U.S. Postal Zip Code book or in previous volumes of the SURNAME INDEX.
- 7. Place of burial may be inserted under date of death if different from place of death.

- 8. Please do not submit names of ancestors which have been published in the previous four volumes.
- If you are sending in new information or a correction, please mark the card as such, sending a completly new card. Also, please give the volume in which the original was published.
- 10. If you submitted names for previous volumes of the SURNAME INDEX, use the same code number in the upper right hand corner of each card.
- 11. If you have submitted cards for Volumes 1, II, III, or IV, using a previous name or address, please send a note giving both the old and new name or address.
- 12. Indicate when a name, date, or place is unknown; ie: unk. Indicate if an approximate time is known; ie: ca 1763. Indicate if a person is still living; ie: living 1983.
- 13. List any additional information on the back side only.
- 14. Publication of the cards for the SURNAME INDEX will be limited to 15. cards per surname per submitter. An unlimited number of surnames may be submitted.
- 15. Births occurring within 20 years of the publication date <u>WILL NOT</u> be published.
- 16. Automatic cross references will be made to all spouses names on a card. Spouse cards may be submitted if you want to have the additional information included in the IGS surname card file.
- 17. IGS members may submit cards without charge. Non-members may submit cards at the rate of \$.25 per card. Please remit fee when cards are sent.
- 18. We will publish Volume V when we receive 15,000 names. Any additional cards will be printed in Volume VI.
