The following list contains names and descriptions of past-day occupations. It was originally printed in the Illinois State Gen. Soc. Newsletter, Jul/ Aug 1986. Sue Wilkinson has submitted it to us to reprint.

OCCUPATIONS

accomptant - accountant almoner - giver of charity to the needy amanuensis - secretary or stenographer artificer - a soldier mechanic who does repairs bluestocking - female writer boniface - keeper of an inn brazier - one who works with brass brightsmith - metal worker burgonmaster - mayor caulker - one who filled up cracks (in ships or windows) or seams, to make them watertight, using tar or oakum-hemp fibre produced by taking old ropes chandler - dealer or trader; one who makes or sells candles; retailer of chiffonier - wigmaker colporteur - peddler of books cooper - one who makes or repairs vessels formed of staves & hoops, as casks, clicker - the servant of a salesman who stood at the door to invite customers; one who received the matter in the galley from the compositors & arranged it in due form ready for printing; one who makes eyelet holes' in boots using a machine which made a clicking noise; one who cut out leather and allocated it to the workmen. costermonger - peddler of fruits and vegetables cordwainer - shoemaker, originally, any leather worker using leather from Cordova/Cordoba in Spain. crowner - coroner currier - one who dresses the coat of a horse with a curry comb; one who tanned leather by incorporating oil or grease. docker - stevedore dowser - one who finds water draper - a dealer in dry goods drayman - one who drives a long strong cart without fixed sides for carrying heavy loads (a dray) . dresser - surgeon's assisstant in hospital drover - one who drives cattle, sheep, etc. to market; dealer in cattle factor - agent, commission merchant; one who acts or transacts business for another; Scottish: steward or bailiff of an estate fell monger - one who removes hair or wool from hides in preparation for fletcher - one wno made bows and arrows fuller - one who fulls cloth; one who shrings & thickens woolen cloth by moistening, heating & pressing; one who cleaned & finished cloth glazier - window glassman goaler - jailer ANCESTORS UNLIMITED



GIFFORD POPE

Erasmus Abel Pope, b. 12 Dec 1831, where?; d.29 Apr 1898 at Avoca, IA; was fa of Simeon Abel POPE, bd and bp unknown; who m. 9 Jan 1900 at Carlisle, IA Gertie GIFFORD MCTAVISH/MCTISH bd and bp unknown, she died at Omaha 26 May 1964. IOWA STATE HISTORY

Iowa belonged to France, with other territory now belonging to our national domain. In 1763, with other territory, it was ceded to Spain. October 1, 1800, it was ceded with territory from Spain back to France. April 30, 1803, it was ceded with other territory by France to the United States.

October 31, 1803, a temporary government was authorized by Congress for

the newly acquired territory.

October 1, 1804, it was included in the "District of Louisiana", and placed under the jurisdiction of the Territorial government of Indiana.

July 4,1805, it was included as a part of the Territory of Louisiana, then organized with a separate Territorial government.

June 4, 1812, it was embraced in what was then made the "Territory of

June 28, 1834, it became part of the "Territory of Michigan".

July 3, 1836, it was included as a part of the newly organized "Territory of Wisconsin".

June 12, 1838, it was included in, and constituted a part of, the newly organized "Territory of Iowa".

December 28, 1846, it was admitted into the Union as a State.
