# FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

So much has happened since our last newsletter it is difficult to know what to put in this issue. During the past four months we have done genealogical research in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Some Warren County people migrated to Kansas to seek their fortune during the latter half of the 19th century but returned to Iowa when their dream was not realized. Two of these former Indianans were my great grandfathers, Isaiah Frazier and John Ballard Carey. They both returned to Warren Co. Iowa after a period of time. Other Iowans made this same trip but returned to Iowa. Washington County, Kansas was where these two tried their luck. Do you know of others who made this trip?

Next we went to Topeka, Kansas to research in the State Historical Library. We were able to do so for a short time, but as t was a weekend we had to find other things to do. We went to eir museum on Sunday afternoon and did some research on Mon-\_\_y. We proceeded to northeast Oklahoma to do research in the records of the Cherokee Nation where my great grandfather, John Ballard Carey had worked among the Indians under Ulysses S. Grant. The Cherokee were ready to claim me as one of them as several of my surnames are very prominent among the tribe today as well as in the census records taken after the "Trail of Tears" We had dinner with some of the senior citizens of the Cherokee Nation and we felt very much at home with them. Maybe we do have an Indian ancestor. We both have ancestors who lived in Cherokee Territory of East Tennessee, North Carolina and Virginia. Three of my surnames and even their given names are the same as some of my ancestors--Frazier, Carey, and Ballard. Have any of you done research in Indian records and found an ancestor? Let us know how you were able to make the connection.

In San Antonio, Texas we found a very nice genealogical section in the city library. A person could "kill two birds with one stone" by going to San Antonio. There is much to see there and then take your rest in the comfortable airconditioned library. Bob was able to break through on one of his lines while doing just that. He began looking at each book's index in the Tennessee section, found a name of one of his difficult lines and was able to gain at least two more generations. The book was one which contained briefs of wills of Sullivan County, Tenn.

Inter Texans" can do research while warming up a bit this winter. I will write a little about what we learned about doing research in "The Valley" next newsletter.

It is great to know that some of our members have their antenna out for ways to improve our effectiveness as a genealogical society. THAT IS WHAT WE WANT! Here are some recent suggestions--

A White Elephant Auction (Purpose: To enhance our financial status) Lester Dahms reports that he attended a meeting of the Tama Genealogical Society and that each member had brought in an item which he or she could no longer use that had some value left, hopeful for another person. The items he described were definitely useful such as brown eggs, pies, cakes, tools, etc. The group had much fun, paid premium prices for the items, may a contribuation to the society and went home with something that could be used to enhance their own lives. Quite a bargain all wrapped up in an evening of fun and profit for their society. What do you members think of that? Let us know!

Printing of Early Church Membership Lists of Warren County (Purpose: To provide one more good genealogical source for researchers in Warren County and to preserve records.) Rose Bowery, your editor, feels that church records in other locales have been of great value in finding genealogical data that we should definitely preserve all we can obtain for posterity and our own research. It is my understanding that some church records have been lost and perhaps may never be retrieved. Well meaning persons have taken care of some of these records only to have them burned in the house where they were kept. Other records were kept in the church only to have cleaning persons destroy the "dirty, usless books." It was too late to save them. Do any of you know where old church records are kept? Can you copy them for the WCGS so that we can compile a book of old church records? Can you help us save these records? Let us know what you can do to help on this project.

Printing old Mortuary Records of Warren County (Purpose: To provide one more genealogical source of data.) Rose Bowery, your editor, has found books of such records in other genealogical libraries and have found them to contain names of parents, birth dates, death dates, cause of death, family member's names and place of death. The informer's name was also given. Personal information of the financial arrangements was not included and should not be. Who would be interested in this type of record being published by our society? Who could help obtain your local records? Let us know what you want and could do to help on such a project.

Printing of more early atlases (Purpose: To provide our members with additional information regarding locations of farms, churches, schools and cemeteries.) Let us know if you think we should print more of these. We have printed the 1887 atlas in the past.

# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Volunteers for the cemetery project met Saturday, April 28. The immediate goal is to see that the older, smaller cemeteries in the county are not forgotten and abandoned and that all of the cemeteries of the county are well-kept. When we met we had 14 target cemeteries which we believed needed attention for one reason or another. We found only six of them needing further consideration at this time and only two or three of those showing urgent need of attention. We are pleased that the cemeteries are not being neglected. We plan a follow-up meeting in June and hope to have a progress report of any improvements made in the cemeteries for the July-August newsletter. #### LIBRARY ADDITIONS

The library committee has been working getting materials ready to be added to the genealogy section of the Indianola Public Library so that they will be available for summer researchers. Genealogical information has been extracted from Hawkeye Heritage, various newsletters, and news articles. County and state records have been blended with records already on the shelves. Several volumes of Surname Indexes compiled from the Genealogical Helper have been added as well as a volume of Ship Passenger Lists and one of Georgia Records. Genealogical Researchers' Ancestor Surname File of Athems County, Ohio by Mary L. Bowman & Beverly Schumacher, compilers, Athens County Hist. Soc. & Museum, 65 N. Court St., Athens, Ohio 45701, 1986. Beverly Schumacher, corresponding secretary of the society in 1979 maintained an index file of names and addresses of individuals researching ancestors who had once lived in Athens Co., Ohio. This file, kept in alphabetical order by ancestor's surname, included references to all correspondence, telephone calls, personal contacts, and five-generation charts. Mary L. Bowman continued maintaining the index during her tenure of office as corresponding secretary. This will be given to our library committee and will no doubt be placed in our library for your use. This is one I will use for certain!

GERMAN RESEARCH ASSOCIATION SURNAME BOOK, VOL. 1, 1990 contains 7,007 records from 202 members. Your editor, Rose Bowery has just purchased this book and will make it available at our next meeting or to those who may want me to check for them regarding names, places in Germany, etc. The names and locales in the book are in various countries in and around Germany and the United States. It is organized by surname, country, state or province, county or next level administrative district, and city/town. It is an excellent introduction for me (who knows little about German research as yet) and I learned some about the country during my first sitting with the book that arrived just this week. I hope to go to Europe someday to research. This book will be of help.

GERMANIC FAMILY RESEARCH TOURS fully escorted tours to Germany, Switzerland, Austria. In the back of this brochure it tells the itinerary which includes, I am sure, some of the best places to research in these countries. I will keep this brochure with the book for future reference and perhaps list these places in future newsletters.

#### GENEALOGICAL VOCABULARY

Cenotaph: If found on a grave stone means this grave is empty, that the person which is named on the stone is buried somewhere else. The stone was erected to

honor that person may have died somewhere else and the body was not found

or the person may have been buried in another place.

Benoni: The name may be found when researching in New England Puritan families of

the 17th and 18th century. It is a Bible name Rachel, wife of Jacob, gave to her youngest child before she died at his birth. "And it came to pass, as her soul was departing, (for she died) that she called his name Benoni: but his father called him Benjamin." The meaning of Benoni is given as "Son of my sorrow" or "Alas, my son." Colonists usually had a reason for the names they gave their children. This name was usually given to a male child born under adverse conditions. (Submitted by Enola Disbrow from

GROSECLOSE: The Henry GROSECLOSE family resided in Warren County possibly as early as the 1860's and at least in the 1880's near Carlisle, Iowa and are probably buried there I have additional information that will help in the search. Johnson: James Johnson and wife, Martha, parents of Mary Emily and Sussanah Johnson lived in Keokuk Co. Iowa in early 1850's where James died Oct. 15, 1850 and Martha died March 3, 1853 and were buried in the Ford Cemetery in Benton Township. James was born in Virginia (I believe) ca March 11, 1796 and Martha was born in Tenn. ca August 7, 1808. What was Martha's maiden name? Who were James Johnson's parents? Who were Martha's parents? What were the names of their other children? Mary Emily married Isaiah Frazier of Warren County, Iowa and Sussanah married his brother, John Frazier. Are there other James and Martha Johnson descendants living in Iowa? Anyone having information about this family please contact Rose Frazier Bowery, 1005 E. Iowa, Indianola, Iowa 50125.

CAREY, BALLARD: Thomas and Rhoda (Ballard) Carey are both buried in the Ackworth Friends Church Cemetery. Thoma was born 1-13-1791 in Virginia and Rhoda Ballard was born 3-10-1792 in Virginia. They moved to Center Monthly Meeting, Ohio from Mt. Pleasant, Grayson County, Virginia 4-19-1817. Thomas and Rhoda had a son John Ballard Carey, my great grandfather. Who were their other children? Thomas's parents are believed to be Samuel and Rachel (Green) Carey who were of the Grayson Co., Va. church. Who were the parents of Samuel? What other children did Samuel and Rachel have?
