AN EXPLANATION OF DUTCH NAMES

The Dutch who came to America brought some of their singular customs with them. The system of naming children lasted into the 1700's.

When a small child died, the next child of the same sex was given the same name. This is somewhat confusing to genealogists who must carefully check birth dates. The first two male children were named after their grandfathers. This same applied in many cases to the first two females who were named after their grandmothers. Other children were often named after uncles, aunts and other ancestors.

The patronymic system was prevalent in the northern countries of Europe, including Holland. The father's first or given name was given to the son for a surname by adding-s.en.sen.zen or szen (meaning son), adding-s.en.sen.zen or szen (meaning son). There are cases where four brothers fixed their patronymic names as permanent surnames, resulting in four different surnames for their descendants.

Others who came over from Holland adopted surnames with the encouragement of the English when they took over the Colony in 1664. Some of the selected names related to where they came from some of their trade or business, some from physical characteristics (Roosa, from his red hair) and some fixed or kept their patronymic name.

When reviewing Dutch names, we find that feminine names have -je or ie at the end of the name. Due to the inability of many the name. He and his wife, Mary, had a son Abraham Lincolm II, and daughter.Jessie Lincoln. The son died in 1890 while on a trip to Europe. College.
Warren and Jessie Beckwith. Their daughter, Mary Lincoln Beckwith died in 1975 unmarried. Their son Robert Todd Lincoln Beckwith, married three times but had no children. 
