FROM THE LAST MEETING

There were 18 members present at the May 20th meeting. The treasurer reported a balance of \$2,114.45 in the checking account and \$5,457.50 in the Super Saver Account.

President Ev Brightman reported that the bill to close records at the county level had died in committee in the Iowa legislature.


Ev offered to do a yearbook for the group and there was a successful motion that "a yearbook with officers, programs, membership, and other useful information be compiled and printed".

There was a suggestion that the group consider a project for the use of some of the money in the treasury. Ev asked for suggestions from the members.

Ev also asked for volunteers to help with the July potluck. Jane Godwin and Virginia Nelson will help. Others may be needed.

The program was presented by Kay Risser of the Murray schools with the help of 4 of her 8th grade students. They spoke about their field trips and library research to discover the historical trails in Clarke County. Besides the Mormon trail they have found remnants of stage coach and dragoon trails. Of particular interest as a Mormon site is the area at Mt. Pisgah on the farm of Bob Brown, who cares for the site and is very knowledgeable about it. They talked about the two wagon trains that will re-enact the Mormon crossing of the state this summer and about Mormon Trails Day to be held in Murray on June 1.

WARREN COUNTY'S PEOPLE & PLACES ROSEMOUNT PARISH



This summer Rosemount Parish will celebrate its 125th anniversary. The original church (St. Mary's of Perpetual Help) at this location at the junction of Belmont and Whitebreast townships was a frame structure built in 1871. (next page)

Quoting from a history of the parish:

Anthony Keller hauled stone out of the hills for a foundation. Michael Ripperger had a tract of good timber. The John Keller, Ed Harkins, Dan Harkins, Jacob Steger, Paulus Greubel, Thomas Watcher, Mary Stempler, Joseph Dittmer, Andres Kessler, Fredrick Konrad, Andrew Walk, Sebiastian Putz, Peter Heller, Andrew Greisbaum, and Joe Zimmerman families were among the early families of the Parish. All got together and built the church on the brow of a hill opposite the Rosemount post office. The community of Rosemount appears on a county map dating before 1870. It consisted of a post office, livery stable, store and now ancient Quaker cemetery a half-mile from the church site.

The oldest stone in the St. Mary's Cemetery is that of Margaret Zimmerman who died on February 12, 1873 at the age of 73. The church originally was operated as a mission but became an independent parish in 1909. The second resident pastor at the independent parish was Rev. Joseph L. Heller, who was born in the community in 1875 and was the first child to be baptized in the mission.

The old frame church was torn down and the present brick church was built at the site in 1916. Pillars from the first church became a part of the barn on the Paul Keller farm. A picture in the church history book of the demolition of the old church identifies people working on it as: Isabelle Endres Huerter, Jose Kuhn Wadle, Frances Endres Dittmer, Martha Endres Hormyer, Francis Putz, George Kuhn, Jake Ripperger, Barney Endres, August Dittmer, Joe Dittmer and Andy Bauer.

The first baptism at the new church is believed to be that of Coletta Ripperger Hock, on September 3, 1916. The stations were donated by the men from the parish who served during the time of World War I. The various buildings at the site have served as school house, convent, and parish house.

The celebration this summer will be on Sunday, August 11, to commemorate the anniversary. Bishop Joseph Charron will officiate at a Mass at 2:00 PM in Rosemont Church. Following Mass there will be a program and picnic open to the public. As part of the program Liz Putz will recount the history of the parish with the help of some of the younger parishioners. Food stands, games and a raffle will all be a part of the festivities. There will also be a tent with family trees!!!

WARREN COUNTY'S COVERED BRIDGES REMEMBERED

Spaulding Bridge



It crossed South River on the road that snow goes to Lake Ahquabi near the present Water Works lagoon. The lagoon is a remnant of the old river channel that flowed through a corner of Wilson Spaulding's 80 acres as shown on the 1887 Atlas of Warren County. (next page)



At the first annual meeting the board voted to sponsor 2 awards to be known as the ROBERT L. CARTER AWARDS, one as a service award to an individual and one to be given for cemetery education.

The second annual meeting will be on October 12, 1996, at the annual meeting of the Iowa Genealogical Society.

The Iowa Legislature has enacted a bill protecting Pioneer Cemeteries. Part of its contents are:

- 1. A pioneer cemetery is one where there have been six or fewer burials in the preceding fifty years.
- 2. Each county board of supervisors may adopt an ordinance assuming jurisdiction and control of pioneer cemeteries in the county. The board shall exercise the powers and duties of township trustees relating to the maintenance and repair of cemeteries in the county.....
- 3. In lieu of management of the cemeteries, the board of supervisors may create, by ordinance, a cemetery commission to assume jurisdiction and management of the pioneer cemeteries.....
- 4. the costs of management, repair, and maintenance of pioneer cemeteries shall be paid from the general fund.

MORE ON BRIDGES

While working at the Historical Museum Joann Harvey found a list of bridge repair work from the county engineer's office for the years 1897-1902. The article from the Advocate Tribune of April 9, 1903, includes information on the length of each bridge and sometimes the cost of repairs. For instance, it cost \$20.75 to set 8 pilings on the Coon Bridge in Palmyra Township in 1902 and \$54.20 to build the 47 1/2 foot long Spoo Bridge in Belmont Township in 1899. Below are the names of the bridges by township. This includes only those that were built or repaired during those years.

Richland: Shumier, Shumier on Butcher, Parsons, Rogers West, Rogers East, Shauck, Halderman, Slough, Roberts, Brown, Brown Lake, Rawson, Butcher west of Ford, Smith, Shumire (?Shumier), Watts, Jenkensville, Carpenter, Green.

This may help locate families that lived in the area at the time the article was written. With the exception of a couple odd ones like Plug Run and Hardscrabble they seemed to be named after the families whose property they touched or who lived on the road close to the bridge. Some of the names may be alternate names for 1 bridge.
