FROM OTHER IOWA NEWSLETTERS

<u>Clarke County Roots and Branches</u> has a long article "History of Green Bay Cemetery and Some of the People Buried There" by Joanne Barton.

<u>Union County Roots</u>. The society again has made a calendar of historical information. For 1997 they used 1947-50 years ago. The calendars sell for \$3.50 + \$1.00 postage if mailed. They ordered 500 and proceeds go towards a new reader-printer for their library.

To locate someone buried in a national cemetery write to: Director, National Cemetery System; Department of Veteran Affairs; 810 Vermont Ave. NW; Washington, DC 20410. Include full name; date and place of birth and death; state from which the veteran entered military service; rank; military unit in which he served while on active duty.

Census Problems

1790-Washington D.C. is with the Montgomery and Prince George Counties in Maryland.

1820 and 1830-Wisconsin is in the Michigan Census.

1836-Iowa Territory Census included Minnesota.

1840-Montana is with Clayton Co., Iowa.

1860-Colorado is with the Kansas Census. Montana is found in the 1860 Nebraska Census under "unorganized Territory", which also included what is now NE Colorado. Nevada is included with the Utah Census. Oklahoma is with Arkansas, which was then Indian land. Wyoming is included with Nebraska.

And prior to 1880, IA did not mean Iowa, but Indiana.

Virginia once covered many thousand square miles more than it does now. A reference made to a person having been born in Virginia, could mean that person really born in part of: Illinois from 1781-1818, Indiana from 1787-1816, Missouri from 1775-1792, West Virginia from 1769-1863, North Carolina from 1728-1803, Ohio from 1728-1803, Pennsylvania from 1752-1786, and Tennessee from 1760-1803.

Marion County Genealogical Society News has had articles on the old town of Red Rock that is now under the reservoir.

Madison County Genealogical Society newsletter has a long article on place names in Iowa, particularly school house names, from a speech by Paul Barras before the south Central Names Institute at East Texas State University in 1972. Prof. Barras is a native of Madison County.
