- 3. Library of Congress. Materials open. Books from the Dewey system which are in good condition are being transferred to the Library of congress system for accessibility.
 - 4. Archives. Original letters, diaries and published documents.
- 5. Census. Iowa. Some indexes for out of state. IGS has the census material.
- 6. Birth and Death records (County Courthouses) 1880-1925. Delayed birth records (those who were recorded when they wanted to return to country of origin or apply for social security. Microfilm.
 - 7. Marriages from date county was organized.
 - 8. Naturalization papers for some counties.
 - 9. Church records.
- 10. Tax records.
- 11. Library staff will do some specific research by request.
- 12. Due to conditions of books, some are marked to not be copied. Please respect this. No purses, back packs or fanny packs are allowed. Lockers are available.

THE 1997 WARREN CO. FAIR GENEALOGICAL REVIEW by Donna J. Crow

It's 8:00 on Saturday, July 26th. It's already hot, hot, hot! A small group of genealogical folks are trying to clean & spruce up the display area in the corner of a building where there is NO air flow and a LOT of heat. After a little huffing & puffing & moving of display cases, we are ready to start accepting entries.

There are 45 classes and entrants in all but three. Our judge is Jay DeYoung of New Sharon & curator at the North Mahaska Co. Historical Museum. At 1:00, water jugs & fly-swatters in hand & fans a-blowing, the judging commences. Jay is very generous with genealogical remarks, especially those concerning preservation. I've tried to capture the essence of some of his comments below:

- 2. Give enough facts on your 3 x 5 card that other people can follow the history. Just because you know the whole story doesn't mean it's easy for others. Try to be clear regarding references as to whose mother, whose father, etc. (Fair Regulation Rule #3 states that all entries be accompanied by information on a card to show their genealogical connection to the exhibitor.)
- 2. When judging photo classes, the judge (Jay DeYoung) looks for things that are unusual or unique. Everybody has a picture of great-grandpa & grandma sitting with their 8 kids in a row behind them. This year's "Family Group" photo winner had a picture of a woman with crutches in it. He says people with disabilities (including pregnancies) were often hidden from the public and rarely photographed.
- 3. Still on the subject of photos: dust covers on the backs of photos can be made from brown grocery bags. Cut paper to fit back of frame, glue around the edges, then dampen the paper. As it dries, it will tighten up & seal.
- 4. Classes 7-24 are genealogical documents & research material. Even if you've never been granted the "privilege" of receiving Grandma's baby teeth (winner of Personal Item), these are categories anyone can compete in. The judge looked for documents that were "special" or significant to the exhibitor. Was this the item that gave great-grandma's maiden name (1996 baptismal certificate winner)? Was this the item that proved your family came from Europe member by member (1996 Census records winner). Proving what we suspect (or never knew) helps us find the next branch on our family tree.
- 5. If you are going to go to the trouble of making a photo album from old photos, use archival paper (acid-free & buffered), special mounting corners & sheet protectors without PVC (polyvinylchloride). If archival paper is not in your budget, while at the stationery shop, buy a high-rag-content paper (the bond % = the % of rag, the higher the number the better). He offered these sources for products: Light Impressions (800/828-6226) or University Products (800/628-1912).

- 6. Still on the subject of photo albums: "magnetic"-types are a NO-NO. There are two cautions. One, the chemical compounds used in manufacturing the adhesive and/or plastic sheets can damage the photos. Secondly, over time, the adhesive can fail & photos can fall out and get lost.
- 7. Jay promised us a recipe for a soda bath to dip newspaper clippings in. This neutralizes or buffers the paper so no further deterioration happens.
- 8. Exhibit classes 25-36 are for heirlooms & artifacts. I repeat, this is NOT an ANTIQUE class. It can be an antique, but the fact the Grandma used that <u>ink bottle</u> as a flower vase for violets in her "pretend" tea parties is what earned first place in the Glassware class.

As always, the genealogical fair judging is a learning experience. Just when you think you can sway the judge with a story about great-grandma's insane, 4-time married, 1/2 brother he falls for that one where *Lilies of the Valley* are handed-down for over a century by the women of one family (winner of the True Story class). Come join us next year for your "continuing education".

By way of the Contra Costa County, CA GS. "..one of the best ways to identify a person is by the contour of the ears. ... It seems that no two individuals have the same shaped ears. Remember those old photographs that you can't identify? Try this idea and see if it helps.

Union Roots

They have published two more books of stories about the counties' past. One is of military stories from the Civil War to present. From several newsletters (which copied it from others)

All film-negatives, slides, and movies produced between 1889 and the mid-1950s contains nitric acid which will self combust with age, especially if stored in attics and basements. You can have the film tested or test it yourself with a special pen available from archival supply companies. Best advice is to make new copies. Destroy old film very carefully as nitric acid fumes are toxic. "The 1890 census we miss so much was destroyed by such old flammable film. The National Archives now stores its old film in steel drums immersed in water."

Linn County Heritage Hunters "A much over looked source of cemetery records in small towns is the City Hall. They may not have a record of all cemeteries in their town or township, but many times they do have one of the larger cemeteries. Be sure to ask about other genealogical type records. I found one city hall office that had the old bound newspapers from that town. And they do have police records which can give you a clue about a relative."
