## More Bits and pieces about ... Civil War Veterans

The following letters were written by Eli Vance to his wife, Emily. They are the collection of five letters that were featured in a recent article in the *Record-Herald and Indianola Tribune*.

Eli Vance was born 6 February 1834 in Greenbriar County, VA, the son of Henry and Catherine (Cart) Vance. In 1840 they moved to Fayette County, Ohio. On 5 October 1857 Eli married Emily J. Irion, who was born 20 July 1833. They moved then to Warren County, Iowa, where they continued to reside. Eli and Emily had six children: Charles A., born 2 October 1858; Mary, born 24 August 1860; William Thomas, born 1866; Edward W., six months old, died 27 January 1869; Ida May (Main), born 12 November 1870, and Frances Amanda (Shutt), born 3 June 1876. The family attended church at Farmers Chapel, built in 1894, and are buried in the cemetery there. Eli died 7 July 1915.

On 15 October 1862 Eli enlisted in Co. C, 34<sup>th</sup> Iowa Infantry for three years and was inducted into service in Helena, Arkansas. The discharge papers, also included in the collection, indicate that he was Eli Vance attained the rank of Corporal and he was discharged 15 August 15, 1865 from Houston, TX. He was 28 years old, was 5'11", had dark complexion, brown eyes, and black hair, and his occupation was a farmer.

These five letters were found in the belongings of Frank R. Nye, after his death 8 September 2002. The letters were donated to the Warren County Historical Museum and Library by Marian Frances (Shutt) Halliday (granddaughter of Frances Amanda (Vance) Shutt and a cousin of Frank R. Nye. John "Jack" Barker, of Indianola, is another relative.

Benton Barracks  
March 20, 1863

Dear Wife and Children,

I take my pen in hand to let you know that I am well at present and hope when these few remarks comes to hand that may find you enjoying the same blessing. I am in very good health but the other boys the most of them at least cant say so. There is 6 of the boys that is very sick in the barricks. It's a hard site to see so many of the neighbor boys beeing in such a condition. But it is the best that can be done. The hospital is full and they fair better here than they would if there were down at the hospital. They don't take any care of them. They neglect food and medicine.

Hiram Moon is sick, there is very few of the boys but what is sick with various kinds of diseases. There is one of the boys that has inflamation in gland of his throat. His head and neck is swoll so tight he cant hardly breath and it is still

swelling. Well that is all.

Well Emily J., I would like to see you this morning. I think of you and Charley and Mary every hour in the day and what a fool I was for going for I could have stayed. But maybe it is for the best at least. I always thought and think yet that I will come out alright and get home again. I aint like some of the boys that are complaining that they wont never get home again and lays down and think they are going to die and die they will. But I aint that way. I think that I will live just as long as I can see anybody else living because I cant get home. I aint a going to lay down and die. There is no mistake but what there has been some question mark. There has been some that grieve thereselves to death about home and family. There aint any use of such I want to se my family as bad as anybody but I aint a going to set down and make it my (studdy?). There aint any sense in such away doing. I would give any amount to get home and think that I will get home sometime or another. I am satisfied here when know I have to be. I have to be one or the other. I choose the be satisfied.

Well Emily J. Will stop till the mail comes in. I think I will get a letter from you today. Well Emily the mail has come and did not get a letter and I was very much disappointed. Well I will continue my letter and wait till the next mail and if I don't get one then, I shall think they have gone someplace else. There is a large mail for the 34<sup>th</sup> down the river. You must be very careful how you direct. There is some 800 letters at Vicksburg for 34<sup>th</sup>. I have written 6 letters. But have got but one and that was the 11<sup>th</sup> of March and mailed the 12<sup>th</sup>. Direct your letters Benton Barrick at St. Louis, Missouri Co. C 34<sup>th</sup> Ia, Inf. There is great many letters that has got miss carried by some means or other.

Well Emily I would like to be at home today. The best in the world there is furlough granted or will be in a few days. There is 5 men to the 100 and that will entitle 2 from our co. furlough granted and I will be there aint in the co. that has money enough to them ½ way home. I cant tell when we will get any more. The time is past that we was to be paid off. That trip I took took about all the money that I had. That will learn me a lesson and stay in camp. But if it was to do over again. I would make the trip through. I was court marcheld and cleared. A man cant be a full blooded soldier till he is court marcheld. The boys look up to men afraid.

Well Emily I must close my letter my sheet is about full and I cant split a sheet. Write some.

Morgan?  
Oct. 6, 1863

Dear Companion

I take my pen in hand to let you know that I remain in good health and I hope these few lines will find you in the same good health. Emily I received your kind letter this morning and was glad to hear from you again and to hear that you was in good health and getting well.

Well Emily we are still watching the Rebels yet. Expecting an attack everyday. We have a very small force. The Rebels have three to one. They have taken 2 regiments already and if they attack. We will have to fight like Bloodhounds. The Rebels has got 8,000 strong we have only 1,500 many left. We have 16 cannons, the Rebels have 12. We have four gun boats and one seage gun. There will be a hot battle if they do attack us. We have got our possitions very strong. We have got a (livery?) 8 feet high and a gun planted every 30 steps. I think they will have a good time if they get over. We will catch and help down the point of the bayonnet. tHey cant take us what is left is resolved to die before they take us in we use to go in to the battle without are resolved to whip or die or whip is the way in camp. We are prepared and awaiting for them and the sooner the better. The news is today that France is going to take a part with the south. But they have been taken apart for so long. That I don't think anything about the report anymore. If France does, she will get her mess of it before they get out of it. If does would go in for not taking any prisoners. Killing them as fast as we could get in reach of them. They had as well tend to their own affairs and they will have enough to do. We can tend to ours and tend to the south. But if nothing else will but to fight and fight. They will that can get enough of it. That is all that I can say about it.

Emily I think it a long time to see you and the children. I don't care any body else. If it wasn't for you. I would be well satisfied. But I think more of you and the children than anything else in the world. The time is slipping away fast. It will soon be one year and one month Emily. I am in very good health as long as my health is good. I care for nothing.

Well Emily I must close my letter is about full. So no more at present. I remain yours.

Eli Vance to Emily J. Vance

Point Deeraes(?), TX  
January 26, 1864

Dear Companion,

I take great pleasure in answering your kind letter which came to hand today. I will say that I am in the best of health and spirits and hope that these few lines may find you in the same good health and getting along fine. I received a letter from Siles today. I twas the latest letter that I have got. It was written 12<sup>th</sup> of January. The one that I got from you was written the 8<sup>th</sup> of November. But I am looking for a later one from you. The mail is very uncertain here.

Well we are still in camp and will stay here sometime. As there isn't any (guns?) going off in this department. There aint much doubt. We will stay here sometime yet. The Rebels is in 40 miles of us. There is about 6,000 of them. I think there will be movement on them before many days. They are at (Mattgord- --ity?) Gen. Ransem took his division up there the other day. But he was rather afraid to attract them but there will be a force that will give some hale of a (grap and canister?). I wish that there were wood came to close of this think must come to a close some time. I don't like to see the mangled bodies of so many men lying on the battle field let them be \_\_\_\_ the \_\_\_\_;

I don't see what the Rebels can think there at getting whipped on every hand that cant make a stand and whipped the soldiers is getting in earnest about this thing that wont be whipped and it will take a great difference to whip us.

Well Emily I think that I will get home yet before my time is out. The rebels cant hold out one year more. I cant see how they can. I will say that the boys is all in good health at this time. There is William Mordock and Bill Brown that is still with us and the rest of the Palmyra boys is going well there is Lee. Lee yet the rest is dead and gone home.

Well Emily I will leave to close my letter soon. I cant think of any more to write at present.

I will say that I never had my health any better in my life now Emily. I want you to write often and I will do the same. I don't take time to write to anyone but you. I will write Siles one today.

I will close my letter so no more at present. Only I still remain yours till \_\_\_\_ write some. So good by Emily.

August 14, 1864

Well Emily, I have a chance to send my letter this morning. So I thought that I would let you know that I received two letters this AM. I was glad to hear from you again. Nothing does more good than to hear from you. To hear that you are all well and be that you have plenty to live on. Emily, you wanted to know whether to sell the old sow or not. If you think best sell her. I don't care she will bring you a big pile of money. She has got her ears tore off and spoiled the looks of her. Know that the money will do you more good than the sow. If you can buy a colt buy it. I will send you about \$60 next payday. So no at present yous as wever.

Eli to Emily J Vance (more on other side)

Some of this is wrote with a pencil. Don't know whether you can read it. It was the best I could do at the time.

Well Emily as I havent any chance to send my letter. I thought that I would send you a few lines more. Well Emily I wished that you would get me stuff and make me two flannel shirts and sent them to me. I cant get any that I can wear that is any account. I wished that you would make them in \_\_\_\_\_ and without a collar. Make them to wear a collar on and a pocket in the side. But blue mint or steele mint same good collar. This is the 13<sup>th</sup>. Two years ago today that I enlisted. I appears a long time but the time is running away. Well the fleet is hammering away on Fort Morgan. It will fall some. I am in good health to. No letter yet from you. Write some. So good by.

(Separate last half of another letter)

He said he would leave it the major. The Major when he heard that it was me and how the things was. He said that wasn't anything worthy of reducing me and said that I was alright. But if the blame a comin from the other man. He would have been tied up and I will stand to be reduced before I would see any of my men tied up. I have seen enough that there be a man tied up in Co. C yet and not as long as Capt. Clark is in command now that he is aback again. The boys is getting down worse and worse.

Well Emily I have written about all that will interest you. I have written already more than I expected when I commenced. So I will close my remarks for this time by asking you to write soon and often. I will do the same.

Yes I had almost forgotten I received two letters from you yesterday and was glad to hear from you. Again one was dated Sept. 14 and the other Sept. 23<sup>rd</sup>. I very very glad to hear from you. I had just come in off of that and had not heard from you. Well Emily I will close now so no more at this time. Still remain yours, as ever your husband till death. So good by Emily.

Dear Companion,

\_\_\_\_\_ of good health that these few lines may find you all \_\_\_\_\_ hear the next letter that you may receive your helth good and are in good spirits. But I cat see how you can get any money from me. So sorry that I aint able to send you some but cant under the circumstances. I cant get any but I will be able to send you some before long. I hope that I will.

Well Emily I will have to tell you something about our meetings. We have a meeting going off at this time. There has been a great many joine. That was three joined last night. There is a meeting tonight and will continue some-time as long as we stay here. The preacher is the Chaplin of the old 67<sup>th</sup> Indiana and he is a good man and is trying to do good. He has got 7,000 names to his list in the last year. There is some shoulderstraps attends but very few. There aint one in our regiment that attends church and very few know any other regiment. I suppose that they think themselves above the Priest. I cant tell any other reason to tell I think that hell will be full of officers after this war. They will have I have throught to make more there than make here before else they will be crowed with officers. Well enough about that the next place.

I will say that the camp is full of runners of peace. I hope they are all true. There is one in camp this morning about them crusading on terms for peace. But I cant hardly believe it yet. Though it may be true. The paper stated that Abe and (Blare?) had gone to (Sitty) point to meet the Rebel Congress there to make or try to come on some terms of peace. I sometimes think why not now as well as any other

time. The sooner the better for both sides. We can fight on for years but it is increasing the debt and will make the times so much the harder. I hope that we settled this thing now on some reasonable terms it will be best for us and I know it will be best for them. They are almost ruined now and the longer they carry it on the worse.

Emily I hope that I shall be able to eat a 4<sup>th</sup> of July dinner with you nest 4<sup>th</sup> coming and if I have to stay my time out. It will sure come around what a happy day that will be. When all the soldiers come to their houses I think I could make that a pleasant day to me.

I have thought that three years wasn't long to be away. But I have found out different. It appears a lifetime to me since I left you. But the time is passing very fast at present and will soon come when I will be on my march home. Happy rejoicing that I have got out of halter and can go where I please and come when I please. I don't think that I will ever like a soldiers life anymore. I have had a plenty I will take no more in mine. If I had no one at home to think about I could get along fine. But I have someone to think about, that I think more of than the army. So I will quit for a season and let someone take my palace if he wants it and if not I'll write the will have home. There is some that I would like to see go and try it awhile. I think it would tame them.

Well Emily before I close I want you to write some if you are able and let me know about that land. The time will surely be around that the school money will have to be settled. I [the remainder is missing].

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Marieta's Note: In doing some of my own family research recently, I found a couple very interesting resources. The first one is a list of Civil War Soldiers from Warren and Marion Counties. This is NOT an all-inclusive list for the Civil War. It is a list of those soldiers who enlisted in Company G of the 15th Iowa Volunteer Infantry. You will notice that practically the entire company was from these two counties—though more from Marion County than from Warren. The members of the 15th Iowa Infantry (of which Co. G was just one part), who served throughout the entire Civil War, fought in some of the most gruesome and significant battles and served under both General Grant and General Sherman. And, at the completion of the war, these proud soldiers marched in review before the President in Washington, D.C. Source: *History of the Fifteenth Regiment, Iowa Veteran Volunteer Infantry from October, 1861 to August, 1865*, Keokuk, Iowa, 1887.

The second resource is the diary that Cyrus F. Boyd kept from

the time he enlisted in the fall of 1861, until he was promoted and transferred to a different unit in March 1863. This diary is extremely interesting and details a lot of day-to-day activities. *The Civil War Diary of Cyrus F. Boyd, Fifteenth Iowa Infantry, 1861-1863*, The State Historical Society of Iowa, 1953, 1976. This work was originally published in the four issues of *Iowa Journal of History*, Volume 50, 1952.

I have placed photocopies of both books in the Genealogy Section at the Indianola Public Library. If you had an ancestor who served in any of the units of the 15th (not just Company G as listed below) you will want to be sure to look at the *History of the Fifteenth Regiment* book! If you have an ancestor who served with Company G, Boyd's diary is an absolute must! BOTH BOOKS are GOLD MINES! If your ancestor did NOT serve with the 15th, you need to check resources for the unit he served with. Many histories have been written for other units and some diaries and letters have also been published.

An excellent resource for finding out whether something has been published is *Discovering Your Iowa Civil War Ancestry* by Steve Meyer, Meyer Publishing, Garrison, Iowa, 1993. This is where I found out about the Cyrus Boyd diary.

Inter-library loan is often an excellent way to view the books after you know the title and author. In addition, the Iowa Historical Libraries in Des Moines and Iowa City have unpublished diaries and letters that can also be accessed.

Two other good resources are

- 1) *How To Do Civil War Research* by Richard A. Sauers, Combined Publishing, PO Box 307, Conshohocken, PA 19428, 2000; and
- 2) *Civil War Genealogy* by George K., Schweitzer, PhD, ScD, 407 Ascot Court, Knoxville, TN 37923-5807, 1996. The latter reference includes both Union and Confederate information.

## Riding the Train in Warren County

From *The Indianola Record*, Indianola, Iowa, Thursday, October 23, 1902, page 1, col 5

A traveling man who resides on the Indianola branch tells this story of a recent ride he had. . . : "We were bounding along at the rate of about seven and a half miles an hour and the whole train was shaking and rattling along like the scales on a fifteenth century dragon. I expected every minute to see my bones protruding through my skin or find my self standing on my head along the track. Passengers were rolling from one end of the car to the other. I held firmly onto the seat, and did the best I could to keep my feet from cracking the back of my neck like a whip lash. Presently we settled down a bit quieter—at least I could keep my hat on and my teeth did not chatter. There was a meek looking man opposite me. I looked up with a ghastly smile, wishing to appear cheerful, and said: "We are going a little smoother, I see." "Yes," he returned briefly, "we are off the rails now."

Last Thursday morning the Q train coming north was wrecked just this side of Lacona. The trucks on the front car broke down and before the train could be stopped considerable amount of track was torn up and one car ran off the track. The wrecking train came up from Chariton, placed the car on the track and by four o'clock traffic was resumed.

From *The Indianola Record*, Indianola, Iowa, Thursday, October 16, 1902, page 8, col 2

Ackworth—Last Thursday morning as the train came into Ackworth one of the cars jumped the track. The ties were badly cut up and the train did not leave town till evening. Some of the passengers procured rigs and went to Indianola, while some walked. No one was injured.

The train on the Burlington was delayed last Monday morning because of a wreck at Lacona, Iowa and did not arrive in this city until about 11 o'clock. the wreck was in the yards at Lacona and was caused by a brakes man turning a switch too soon and allowing the rear trucks of a box car to run off leaving the engine on the switch and the main line blocked. after several hours of work the line was cleared and the train proceeded to indianola. A number of north and south bound passengers were forced to lay over in this city (Indianola) during the remainder of the day.

Blue Virginia Nelson

My great aunt Lizzie was born in Harrison County, Ohio in 1847 and came to Iowa with her parents in 1850. My great aunt Jane was born in Iowa in 1856. They lived across the road from me in the original Andrew McLandsborough homestead. These aunts were truly "pioneer" women. They wore sunbonnets, aprons and long dresses that almost reached the ground.

I once saw them making soap in a huge iron kettle outside. At the corner of their house stood a barrel in which they put stove ashes and when rain ran over these ashes, lye was produced. This lye, combined with leftover cooking fat and rendered lard, was put into the iron kettle and an old fashion soap recipe was used.

In the summer time, it was cooler to cook in the summer kitchen. It had a kerosene stove and there was a black box oven that was used for baking. I remember enjoying their delicious rolled sugar cookies.

I remember they raised chickens. Old hens sat on nests of eggs and when the little chickens hatched, the hens were moved to smaller coops throughout the grove of trees surrounding the house. When the chicks were old enough, the hens had a way of letting them know that they were on their own. A large chicken house provided housing and nest boxes for all the chickens during the winter and egg laying seasons.

They also raised guineas to alarm the hens of roving foxes. Their screeching could be heard from time to time. The hens, little chickens and guineas roamed the grove eating bugs, grasses and corn was also fed to them.

In those days, corn was picked and stored on the cob—not shelled like it is now. In their barn was a corn sheller. The corn was put in one end, a handle turned, the corn kernels fell into a container and the corncob was spit out at the other end. The corncobs were saved to start fires in the cooking and heating stoves in the house.

The selling of eggs to the market in Oskaloosa, Iowa provided the sisters one means of spending money. The rent from the farm probably provided them with their only income. No Social Security in those days for farmers.

The most vivid memory I have of my aunts was when my sister, Elaine, and I spent one night at their house. My Grandmother McLandsborough was having surgery and my folks had gone to Ottumwa, Iowa to pick up grandma's daughter, Elizabeth (McLandsborough) Holmes. I suppose the old ladies didn't want us falling out of bed so we

were put in the middle of the bed between them. I recall sinking down into the feather mattress. Right by the bed, a stovepipe ran up to the chimney and I remember being "so hot."

They were dear, old ladies and I am glad I had the honor and the privilege of knowing them.
