IGS is moving to its GRAND new home!

The Iowa Genealogical Society will close on Friday, May 23 at the 6000 Douglas Avenue location and will reopen Monday, June 9 at the new location of 628 East Grand Avenue. This is across the street north of the Iowa Historical Museum and Library.

The new location is twice as large (8,000 square feet) as the current facility (4,000 square feet) and has an additional 4,000 square feet that will serve as a rental unit for additional income until needed by IGS sometime in the future. IGS has leased the old facility all these years, but is taking the bold step of purchasing the new building.

A fund-raiser Ancestor Memorial Wall is being placed in the front entrance. Cost is \$175 and is a wonderful way to help IGS, honor your family and give testament to your commitment to "Preserving the Past and Enriching the Future."

We recently lost a genealogy friend. WCGS member, Elizabeth "Liz" Putz, passed away on April 3. For Liz, genealogy was a natural, because, for her, family was top priority. Often she was not able to attend meetings because she was babysitting for grandchildren. Liz was a 4-H leader for 30 years. She was my 4-H leader during her first years as a leader. When she joined WCGS, she was just as supportive of the things I was doing as WCGS President as she had been of me when I was doing various projects and activities in 4-H. Liz was always supportive and full of encouragement. I'm sure many others also benefited over the years from her support and encouragement.

After my Salt Lake City research trip, I finally broke down and said we must subscribe to Ancestry.com. But, as is so often the case, other things had to come along with it. Our 56k modem wasn't fast enough, so we are having to adjust. The Genealogy Corner in the Indianola Public Library contains the WCGS genealogy collection. Recently, I met with Joyce Godwin, the Public Librarian, and we discussed

several changes that could make the Genealogy Corner more user friendly. Since then, Thelma Pehrson and I spent a Sunday afternoon sorting out items that did not really fit in the Genealogy Corner. Willa Grissom is making a new sign, and we've gotten new folders to hold the Shelf List in obvious places throughout the area. Also, the many maps and atlases have been moved to a more convenient place within the "corner" instead of being hidden away elsewhere. The Shelf List is being updated to also include the items that are housed in other parts of the library, i.e., the 1879, 1908, 1952 and 1987 Warren County History books that are located behind the library attendant's desk and the genealogy reference books that are located in section 929 of the circulation shelves and can be checked out. In addition, Willa is in the process of labeling some of the folders and notebooks to be more easily identified. Please stop by the Genealogy Corner and see what you think.

Moving Trucks Have Monopoly on March Roads

Change in Residences This Month Breaks All Records for Previous Years

Research Helps:

My trip to the Salt Lake City Family History Library

March 24-29, 2003

This was my first trip to "THE LIBRARY." What an experience! The trip was both exhausting and exhilarating.

My goal at the library was not to "go back" more generations. Instead, I was trying to "fill in" many blanks and "verify" information I already had. Much of this was accomplished--in ways I would never have imagined.

Helpful hints:

1) **Do your homework.**

A) **Determine which families you are going to work on at the library.** You can't research them all, so just pick 2 or 3. Then, prior to going, be sure you have found these families on every available census during their lifetimes. If you can't find them somewhere, then you know this is something you will want to research at the library. At the library you will look for them at the last known place and look for other records the library may have that could give you clues as to their whereabouts. Obituaries and military pension records are good sources for where a person lived during their lifetime. However, land records and wills/probates are also good sources and can often give you an unexpected clue. Often the latter records will give the individual's name and then indicate "of ___", which is exactly the clue you may have been looking for.

B) **Research the Family History Library online catalog at FamilySearch.org.** This is a must! Before going, determine as much as possible what you will need to look at while there. Especially keep in mind that the several million microfilms can be circulated to you through the local Family History Library, HOWEVER, the books do not circulate. Therefore, you should place priority on looking at the books on the shelves, while at the library. When I looked up items on the online catalog at home, I printed out the sheets on colored paper. This was very handy since it distinguished those papers from the white photocopies at the library.

2) **Take your family group sheets with you, but, IF you have properly documented your family group sheets, you will not need any of your other documents, etc.**

3) **Understand the Dewey Decimal System.** This is the order in which the books are located on the row

after row of stacks of books. You will carry your print out from the online catalog with you as you look in the stacks.

4) **The millions of microfilm rolls are located in floor-to-ceiling cabinets that are lined up row after row.** Again, you will carry your online catalog print out with you as you hunt for specific roll numbers. And, you will get your exercise bending and stretching, or using the step stool to access the rolls you want to view.

5) **Be sure you are computer literate.** Dozens of computers have been added to the library within the last two years. You will be totally lost if you don't know how to use one. You need to be familiar with the FamilySearch.org web site since this is the ONLY place where you will find the card catalog. Not only is the card catalog online, but at the library you will also have access to several subscription-only websites, including Ancestry.com. While you have this opportunity for free access to these sites, you will want to browse through them if you are not already familiar with them.

6) **Plan to dress comfortably, but don't look sloppy.** In this case, I would say it is better to dress-up a little, for example, nice slacks, rather than jeans. The staff members and dozens of volunteers will have on dresses and suits.

7) **You can take book bags and even suitcases on wheels into the library.** I used a travel catalog case on wheels, which proved to be very handy. I took blank file folders with me and when I had gathered several sheets of information on a given area or individual, I put the information together in a file folder and used a Post-It note to label the file folder, knowing that I wouldn't permanently keep the information in that folder after I had processed the information at home. However, this was an excellent way to organize the many papers I accumulated. No need to take a stapler or scissors. There are staplers and paper cutters in handy locations near the photocopiers.

8) **Photocopies are very reasonable.** Five cents each for regular photocopies and 23 cents each for microfilm reader/printer copies. Another option is to buy a CD from them for \$1.50 and for 30 minutes a day, use a computer to scan books and microfilm onto the CD. This greatly reduces photocopy expense. I observed two people working together to get their materials scanned--they were very organized and would have gotten a lot scanned in their 30 minutes.

- 9) **Be prepared to be on your feet**--either standing or walking. This is not a must, but much more convenient.
- 10) **Limitations:** 1) The library does not have microfilm of newspapers. Their stance is that the states have done an excellent job of microfilming old newspapers and they will leave that to the states. 2) There is no consistency as to what records the library has for a given county. You may find excellent vital records, probates, wills, land records, etc for one county and find almost nothing for another county. This is because the counties differed on what they let the LDS team microfilm when they visited the county. (I think Warren County researchers can thank Louise Pilmer and others for making sure that EVERYTHING in Warren County was microfilmed.)

What did I find?

I followed a brother (Henry Clay McNeill) of my great-great-grandfather (Alfred McNeill) across the south and west. Henry was born in Lee County, Iowa. He served in the Civil War battles following the Mississippi River south to New Orleans. After the war he lived in Florida, Tennessee and died in Oregon. Prior to going to SLC, I only knew Henry's name, birth date, death date (which proved to be wrong), death location and wife's name (Myra) and her approximate birth date. I did not know he had served in the Civil War and I had no idea he had lived in the south and I had no idea he had two daughters (Gertrude and Floy) and I have found his wife living with Floy and her husband in California after Henry's death. There is still more to find, but I've come a long ways. I was lucky enough to find a published book of newspaper abstractions for the town where Henry died. Then I found his obituary abstraction and items telling that his younger daughter (Floy--actually "Florida," guess where she was born!) had graduated from normal school and was a teacher in the town where they lived. I found them on a census record for Oregon and found land records for them in Oregon. His obituary said he had lived in Florida and Tennessee. I then found them on census records in Florida, giving the county and township where they lived. From there I found land records for him in Florida. I have not found definite proof that he lived in Tennessee, except that his daughter Gertrude stayed in Tennessee after marrying someone I suspect was from Tennessee. Next step: write for his Civil War pension file. Hopefully, I'll find tucked within this file, more information about where they lived in Tennessee. Also, I'd like to find where and when his wife died.

I found my great-great-grandfather (Alfred McNeill) with his daughter (Edith), her husband and 7-year-old son, living

for one year in Ellis County, Oklahoma. The year happened to be 1920. Therefore, they were on the 1920 census. I know they probably lived there only one year because I happened to find country school records (this is a rarity). Since the grandson was 7 years old, I knew he should be in school. I found him in 1920. When I checked 1919, he was not listed, though he could/should have been. When I checked 1921 and 1922, he was not listed. Therefore, it appears they lived there only one year. This county did not have land records for me to check. Hopefully, I will get to visit this county later this summer and can find out more then.

I found microfilm for the original city clerk's books for Alfred McNeill's great-grandfather listing marriage and children's birth dates in Whiting, Vermont. Seeing this book was wonderful! The city clerk recorded everything from land transactions to births, deaths and marriages, to recording earmarks for animals and advertising a horse for sale in the same book. While I already had the birth, death and marriage information contained in the records, I did not have documentation for the information and seeing so many things tucked away in one city clerk's book was fascinating.

Alfred McNeill's wife was Harriet Smith. Harriet's mother was Esther Jacquays. I found the will and probate information for Esther's father, Norris Jacquays. Again, we already had the information, but not the documentation. Seeing the real thing adds further perspective to the stories contained within. We didn't know that Esther and one sister were left out of one part of the will. Why? We don't know, unless they lived a distance away and the daughters living close by got to divide the household goods.

Alfred McNeill's mother-in-law, Esther, has been a mystery for years. This winter I e-mailed the librarian in the town where they lived in Blaine County, Oklahoma, and received a response as to where she is buried. At SLC I found cemetery records, listing Esther, and was surprised to also find a marriage record, and an abstraction from the newspaper about the wedding of Alfred's daughter Edith and her husband George Morrill.

Some of the stories get complicated as did some of my research. A couple times I got discouraged and wondered where I was going to try next. **Word of warning:** The first time you visit this library, it will take at least a half day, just to get oriented. But it may not be the first half day you are there. For me this came the second day. The first day I did very well and found lots of stuff. By the afternoon of the second day the going got rough and I really had to dig in and figure out the system. After that I kept going, except that after a couple more days I had to spend an evening sorting through what I had found and determining where to go from there.

I limited the number of families I was researching at the library. You just wouldn't be able to do justice to anyone if you tried to include too many families. I concentrated on the McNeill family and did sideline research on the Jacquays and Grissom families. I will research other families on other trips.

It was amazing how many people make an annual trip to SLC. They figure they can do a year's worth of research in one week at SLC. The first couple days at the library were extremely busy--lots of people. The rest of the week was busy, but not so extremely crowded. I can't imagine what the library would be like during the summer months when they say it is very busy. Next time I'll go during January or February--when it is supposed to be less crowded. They say the best time to go is the first week in December--but I doubt I will go then.

The library is closed on Sunday. It is open on Monday from 7:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Then, Tuesday through Saturday it is open 7:30 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. There was always a line at the front door when it opened, but it really began to thin out by 9:00 p.m.

The Best Western Salt Lake Plaza Hotel is located next door to the library and this is where I stayed. If you go out the back door of the Hotel, it is approximately one "Indianola" block to the front door of the library. (City blocks in SLC are considerably longer than in Indianola.) Room rates were reasonable (they have a genealogy rate and sometimes a free night if you stay "X" number of nights) and the hotel has a restaurant. Many rooms have refrigerators, so I bought cold cereal, milk and juice for breakfast and ate most of my other meals in the hotel restaurant. The hotel offers a shuttle to and from the airport. You need to tip the driver, but otherwise, it is free. I had a direct flight on Delta from Des Moines, so no changing planes or other hassles.

The week went very smooth, but it was exhausting. Yet, I found a lot of good material and am very exhilarated by it all. Now I just have to get all the information processed! And, get ready to follow up on the next questions.

His wife and 8 of his children were with him at his death, 2 sons who live in Idaho were not here then. The funeral was conducted with Masonic honors from the M. E. church at Sandyville. Ulyses BURGER was born in Virginia October 9, 1817. When he was 13 in 1830, he moved to Henry county, Indiana and to Andrew county, Missouri in 1845 and married Margaret WADELL, november 11, 1841. They moved to Warren county, Iowa in 1846. They had ten children, 5 of each. Three sons died in early manhood. January 29, 1891 Mrs. BURGER died. Mrs. DAVIS is a sister to the late Rev. HUNT.
