Warren County Cemeteries

The cemetery books are progressing. Thanks to Debbie Larrison, Hartford will be updated by County Fair time. All that's left is the index and final formatting.

Ginny Schaefer has taken on the update for the New Virginia Cemetery and that is a large one that won't be finished for at least another year.

The Ackworth cemetery is almost ready to be walked. Any volunteers????

The Indianola cemetery is still in the computer with about 10 rows left to type. I don't think it will be finished by fair like I promised, but shortly after.

These cemeteries take a lot of work to complete accurately, and we are grateful for the efforts of everyone who has helped. This involves a lot of typing and time because we are trying to add additional information about parents and children as well as transcribing the gravestone. The Hartford book will be over 200 pages when finished, the Indianola book will be over 400 pages, and the smaller cemeteries run between 50 and 100 pages so you can imagine the work required.

Our updated cemeteries that have been completed include Indianola East Side, Pleasant Ridge, Randolph (Adamson), Eberman, Hewitt, Churchville, Wallace, North River, Webb, Shaver, Liberty Center, Hendrickson, Christian Neck, Highland, Peck, Scotch Ridge, Murray, Moore, Black, Halterman, Goshen, Palmyra, Conklin, St. Marys, and Dillman. SCANNING DOCUMENTS

Dick Eastman publishes an online newsletter for genealogists - <https://blog.eogn.com/>. On July 13, 2018, he published an interesting article with information about cell phone scanners. Using the camera on a cell phone or tablet is an excellent way to copy old documents without damaging the fragile pages. It helps to have a friend hold papers flat if necessary.

I recently needed to scan some probates at the courthouse. I've used a flip scanner in the past but that takes too much time. So I tried something new. I downloaded the app "Clear Scanner"

to my tablet and took pictures of the pages. The app could detect the edges of the paper and blocked out the surrounding background. It was difficult to align the camera perfectly with the paper document but that wasn't a problem because the app straightened out any skewing of the image. The image could be easily converted from JPG to PDF and the pages could all be put into one PDF document. There was also an OCR feature to easily convert the image into text for editing. I could easily send the document to somewhere in the "cloud" or email it right from the program on my tablet. There are other editing features that I haven't used yet.

Clear Scanner is one of several scanning programs available for android and apple devices. I chose this particular program because it was free, but there are others that are inexpensive and might do more things.

DNA CORNER

We've all seen the Ancestry DNA commercials: "Growing up we were German... we're not German at all, 52% of my DNA comes from Scotland and Ireland", but how accurate is that DNA test? Should you assume your ancestors did not know what country they emigrated from or that your written documents are pointing you at the wrong country? Absolutely not! Should you assume the DNA test is simply "junk science" and, therefore, worthless. Absolutely not! DNA tests have come a long way in the past 15 years and are actually accurate in helping you to find cousins and other relatives. Used properly they can help you isolate descendants of a Most Recent Common Ancestral (MRCA) couple.

What you do have to be careful with is those pie charts that the testing company gives you indicating you are 48% German, 33% British, <2% Native American, etc. Take these estimates "with a grain of salt." Why? Because those estimates are NOT science, they are simply based on your scientific results. Huh?!? Let's look at an example from some of the accounts that I administer.

The Science

The numbers in the following table indicate the shared centimorgans (cM) between each of the testers. These numbers confirm the biological relationship between each of the testers.

For example:

- Each person has around 6800 cMs
- Average cMs shared between parent and child is around 3400 (½ of the child’s DNA comes from each parent) with a range of 3330-3720
- Average cMs between siblings is around 2550 (3/8 of their DNA) with a range of 2209-3384. Remember that although each child inherits 50% of their DNA from their parents, siblings do not inherit the same 50% so it is possible that Daughter 1 passed along more of her mother’s DNA to Granddaughter 1 than she did to Granddaughter 2. So Granddaughter 1 would have more than 25% DNA in common with her maternal grandmother, and less than 25% in common with her maternal grandfather.
- Average cMs between aunt/uncle and niece/nephew is around 1700 (¼ of their DNA) with a range of 1349-2175

- Daughter 1 matches each of her siblings with between 2495 and 2625 cMs; which is within normal parameters indicating they are siblings
- Daughter 1 matches her daughters with 3381 and 3384 cMs; which is within normal parameters indicating they are her daughters.
- The granddaughters share 2547 cMs with each other; which is within normal parameters indicating they are sisters.
- The granddaughters share between 1484 and 1713 with their aunts and uncle; which is within normal parameters indicating they are their nieces.

The Estimates

Now looking at the European region of the pie charts for each of the testers, the numbers indicate the percentage of the testers DNA that matches that region / sub-region.

Everyone indicates European ancestry of 93-99%, which would appear to confirm the scientific numbers. However, if you look at the breakdowns of the sub-regions within the European region, the numbers are often drastically different:

- Daughter 1 has 19% Iberia. As the mother of the two granddaughters you would expect each of them to have at least 9-10% (since they got ½ of their DNA from their mother); however, Granddaughter 1 has no Iberia and Granddaughter 2 has only 3% Iberia.
- Daughter 1 shows 10% West / Central Europe. You would expect each of her siblings to show at least a trace since they all got ½ of their DNA from each of their parents; however, only one of her siblings shows West / Central Europe (23%)
- Daughter 1 shows 34% British Isles. All of her siblings show a much higher percentage of British Isles. How

could one sibling be 93% while the other is only 34%; the numbers are too drastically different to make logical sense.

- Only Daughter 2 and the Son show any Southeast Europe and that is only a trace (less than 2%). This is more likely since a trace could indicate a false positive or could be attributed to DNA inheritance patterns.

So what could account for these differences at a sub-region level? It could be attributed to the actual DNA that each of the testers inherited from the MRCA couple. However, it also comes down to the number of samples in the testing companies database for the particular region being indicated and how that company is choosing to group their regions. Look at their maps to get a better idea of what a “region” means for that testing company. For example:

- 23 and Me says they have over 10,000 people in their reference sample database covering over 120 countries; with 6,842 of that total being “European”

- Ancestry says they have 3,000 reference samples covering 363 regions
- Family Tree DNA indicates they have 1,353 samples covering 36 reference populations

As their reference sample database gets larger, their estimates will get better. According to 23 and Me:

“If you don't see an expected ancestry location, that doesn't necessarily mean that you don't have ancestors who lived there. It could simply mean that you do not have enough shared DNA with our reference dataset for us to confidently assign that location to you.”

According to Ancestry:

“Your DNA doesn't change, but the science we use to analyze it does. Your results may change over time as the science improves.”

TAKE YOUR SMART PHONE (AND BINOCULARS) WHEN YOU RESEARCH AT A CEMETERY BUT MAYBE NOT FOR THE REASONS YOU MAY BE THINKING!

Recently my husband and I were researching at a cemetery in north central Missouri. We had never been to this area before so had no clue where the grave markers we needed were located.

Our homework before embarking on this research outing included checking the published cemetery book for the county... which, by the way, had all names listed in alphabetical order. Didn't you know that all people are buried in alpha order? Anyway, this city cemetery was larger than we expected. After roaming a little, Dave suggested that I pull up the Find-A-Grave app on my smart phone to see if the stones had been photographed. Awesome idea!

By checking the app we learned the color of the stone, the shape of the stone, the approximate size, style of lettering, whether it had a rough top surface or smooth, etc. In other words, we had good visual image of what we were searching for. Then by using our binoculars, we could visually survey the cemetery without having to walk up and down the many rows of stones. (Please remember that Find-A-Grave photos are copyrighted, so you should not pull off those pictures to include in your records without the photographer's permission. In my genealogy software, I source the Find-A-Grave

memorial #, individual's name, name of cemetery and its location, but do not include a photo unless it is one we have taken.)

His idea was a huge help for us, and a suggestion that I think needs to be passed along!

However, at a nearby country cemetery, I could not get adequate cell service, so we didn't have this idea available to us. Thus, the better recommendation may be to check Find-A-Grave for possible photos of the grave markers BEFORE going out to the site. Thankfully for us, this was a much smaller cemetery.

So, Find-A-Grave, a smart phone, and binoculars are now included in our cemetery research toolbox.
